This has allowed the discipline committees to thrive as they react to changes in their specific professions and bring ideas and solutions to the board for ratification.

Looking ahead three to five years, what do you see as the most important issues this board should be focused on?

Our profession is now global, so working on international issues (standards, membership, country-specific practices, etc.) is important for our society to thrive. Also, our educational offerings have improved in recent years, so we need to continue to provide the highest level of learning for both new and experienced appraisers.
